As you travel on Lakeshore Drive you'll see a new, 4'x12', full-color digital sign at the bend near the St. Joseph High School athletic fields. Each day the sign informs commuters and visitors entering the city what is happening in the school district and around town that day as well as about upcoming events.

"Both the city and the school district wanted a timely way to communicate important

messages," said SJPSF President Bill Marohn. "The collaboration made it possible. The school district will primarily use the board from September through May to talk about school news and the city will use it to inform residents and visitors of all of our year-round activities."

Funding for the sign and landscaping came entirely from private donations.

Special thanks go to the St. Joseph Improvement Association, Schalon Foundation, Frederick S. Upton Foundation, Erik and Irene Fiskars and numerous other donors. One anonymous donor gave money for landscaping that was designed by Lori Nye-Bolt, a former SJPS student, who created the maize and blue floral theme.

We talked with math teacher Carol Morris, now using the new interactive technology.

How has it improved student learning?

I teach Algebra 2, 1-5th hours. With the interactive board and its unlimited space I can cover more examples. The software and different multimedia make learning more interesting. Students pay closer attention.

How does it change how you teach?

It takes more prep time because I use more examples. But once I create the charts and graphs, I save them in the software instead of recreating them every hour. That gives me more time to teach and answer questions.

Who else is using the "Classroom of Today" at the high school?

I'm the only one. I spent four days this summer being trained by the manufacturer. The district is training more teachers. Our hope is that the community will support future bond issues so this technology can go in every classroom.

TEACHERS' WISHES GRANTED IN 2008

- “Fun Decks” materials to promote continued understanding of communication skills for SLI (Speech and Language Impaired) students as well as students identified with ASD (Autistic Spectrum Disorder)
- Materials for the “Circle of Friends” program – third and fourth grade students in the district will be trained to act as peer models, helpers and leaders, with an emphasis on disability awareness
- One classroom set of dictionaries – to help students understand and utilize the grade-level content expectations for our fourth grade district and state curriculum
- New cubbies/mailboxes for both kindergarten and Young Fives classrooms to help teach responsibility and organization
- Fiction and non-fiction trade books for grades one and two to meet a wider range of reading levels
- Social studies magnet boards to help students in the class who are autistic and need visual aides
- “Singapore Math” materials to help those students struggling in math
- Materials and children’s books that correspond with 6+1 Traits of Writing and Writing Strategies That Work!
- Literature Circles/Guided Reading materials (fourth grade)
- Boardmaker Program – a teaching tool for the communication development of all students, especially those with ASD
- A set of student dry-erase boards and markers for foundation-level math students so instruction can be modified to fit the students’ needs
- Science class materials
- Writing Mentorship Program - a high school writing student works with fifth graders as writing mentors
- New life jackets for the third grade swimming and water safety program
- Kindergarten literacy materials
- MEAP Jumpstart Test Prep materials for math and Language Arts
- Elementary media department to sponsor a nationally recognized author or illustrator to present at all three buildings
- DVDs, World Music Resources and percussion instruments for the classroom, plus DVD player and digital camcorder and accessories for the orchestra students
- Two digital cameras for classroom use and two video iPods to be used by the science, English and social studies departments
- Field trip for all fourth graders in the district to the Heritage Museum and Cultural Center to view a new exhibit, “Working Waterfronts: Planning and Preserving the Maritime Traditions of St. Joseph and Benton Harbor”
- “Stress Out” kits – these kits are an interactive way for the counseling staff to work with “at risk” students
- “Read Naturally” Masters Edition Fluency Program sequenced series – to improve fluency, comprehension and build vocabulary for Upton students in the special education department
- Mat board cutter and mat board to provide a professional look and quality feeling to student artwork
- The purchase of 20 copies of *The Seven Habits of Highly Effective Teens* to be used in this Academic Achievement class
- Picture books to engage students (for all elementaries) in the interactive processes necessary to create meaning during reading
